Native American Culture Individual Project

There are 5 different learning activities to choose from:

- 1. Design and create a diorama to model your Native American culture.
- 2. Develop a PowerPoint presentation to educate others about your Native American culture.
- 3. Design a travel brochure to encourage people to visit your Native American culture.
- 4. Create a board game that teaches others about your Native American culture.
- 5. Create an informational poster about one of our early American cultures.

You will be working individually, <u>NOT</u> with a group. If you have ANY questions or need help on your project, please come see me either before school or after school, or during class.  Where was your tribe located? Provide a map. What are the characteristics of this region, for example are there mountain, woods, ocean or deserts? Here's how you will be graded:

I will score you using the appropriate rubric. I will take your total points earned and divide it by the total points (24) possible. This will give me a percentage. I will divide this in $\frac{1}{2}$ and that will be the number of points you earn. Example: If you receive 20 points, $20\div24=83.3\%$ $83.3\% \div 2=$ 41.65 or 42 points

Native American Culture Diorama

Construct a Diorama, no bigger-than-a-shoebox model of your Native American culture. Give it detail with textures; add plant-life and animals models. You will also write a paragraph telling about the items you chose to add to your diorama and how they represent your Native American culture.
